



GIFT SHOP AND CAMP STORE

The park has four gift shops at the visitor center, the Lodge, the campground, and the multi-sporting facility. Shop for Tennessee State Park souvenirs, snacks, refreshments, toiletries, essential gear and “Made in Tennessee” items.

THE BUFORD ELLINGTON GOLF COURSE

Our 18-hole championship level par 72 course is along the Duck River corridor, and is operated year-round, featuring manicured greens and open fairways. The pro shop has a seasonally operated snack bar—a great place to savor a cold beverage and an enjoyable light meal. The course also has a fleet of Club Cars, a driving range, and a practice green. Rental clubs are available; call 931-364-2319.

CAMPING

Situated near the scenic Duck River, primitive-style tent sites and paved RV sites include water, electric, and Wi-Fi. While the sites do not offer septic attachments, two nicely maintained bathhouses and a dump station serve campers. Adventurous, prepared campers can reserve a backcountry campsite located one mile from the camp store. A hammock campground is located at the bottom of the RV loop, featuring six hammock-only primitive sites. In the north campground, there are three large group fields for up to 50 people per site, and nine overlander-style campsites that will fit a small trailer or overlander setup. These feature a fire ring, lantern hook, and picnic table. This area does not include Wi-Fi, electricity, or water. Pets are welcome in all campsites, but they must be kept on a leash and may not be left unattended.

BICYCLES

Bicycles are allowed on paved roads within the park. There is a bike repair station and tire pump at the visitor center. Tennessee State Law requires the use of helmets for all riders 16 and younger.

FISHING

A Tennessee fishing license is required by anyone over the age of 12 to fish on the Duck River. Licenses are not sold at the park, but can be acquired online at gooutdoorstennessee.com/. The camp store offers bait and tackle, fishing guides are available upon request, and our park rangers are available to help any angler find the perfect fishing areas along the banks of the Duck.

TRAP AND SKEET RANGE

The park features a professional, multi-field trap and skeet range with all new, automated throwers. There are also archery targets in this area. The multi-sporting facility offers rental guns, ammunition, and other range supplies. A range master is on hand to assist.

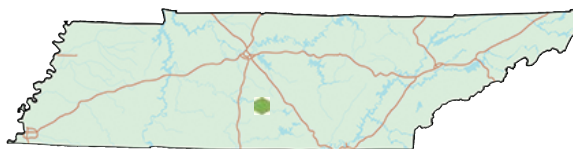
